SACRAMENTS

Infant Baptism: Celebrated on the second and fourth weekend of each month; Saturday at 3:00 p.m. or Sunday following the 11:30 a.m. Mass. Baptisms also may be celebrated during Mass (except during Holy Week). Please contact Deacon Jim (757-898-5570). Parents are required to complete a Baptismal Preparation session prior to a Baptism; these are presented on the first weekend of January, March, May, July, September and November following the 11:30 a.m. Mass. Session dates and location will be posted in the bulletin.

Confirmation: This Sacrament fortifies us in the power of the Holy Spirit for a full experience of human living. Confirmation is conferred normatively upon teens in their sophomore year or through the RCIA process for all those, children or adults, who are converting into the fullness of the Catholic faith. Sincere preparation must precede the reception of this beautiful Sacrament.

Anointing of the Sick: The Sacrament of the sick may be received after weekday or weekend Masses with prior notice. The Sacrament may also be celebrated with a personal visit to a home or care facility so that family and friends may be present.

Sacrament of Marriage: Couples called to the Sacrament of Marriage should contact the Parish Office at least 6 months prior to the desired wedding date. Please make no firm arrangements until meeting with the Deacon/Priest.

The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass

Christ is always present to his Church, especially in the actions of the liturgy. He is present in the sacrifice of the Mass, in the person of the minister (it is the same Christ who formerly offered himself on the cross that now offers by the ministry of priests) and most of all under the Eucharistic species. He is present in the sacraments by his power, in such a way that when someone baptizes, Christ himself baptizes. He is present in his word, for it is he himself who speaks when the holy Scriptures are read in the Church. Finally, he is present when the Church prays and sings, for He himself promised: *Where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there in their midst.*

SMALL GESTURE, BIG DIFFERENCE

Reflection on Mark 12:38-44

Sometimes, it may seem that what we are doing with our lives is not all that important. We may look at others who appear to be, well, important people – well-dressed, intelligent folk who are making great contributions to the world – and then look at our own lives and be tempted to think of them as rather insignificant.

The widow in this Gospel passage did not give very much, but Jesus praised her. Her small gesture of generosity came, not from her surplus, but from her substance. Small gestures, when done from the core of who we are, can make a decided difference in the larger scheme of things.

In Mark's Gospel, this passage is sandwiched between Jesus giving the Great Commandment (love God/love neighbor) and Jesus speaking about the end of times when each of us will have to give an accounting of our lives. Perhaps the account we should strive for is embodied best in this widow's gesture: making concrete the command of love by giving of all we are, all we have – our very substance, our very selves.

SAINT FRANCES XAVIER CABRINI

Feast Day: November 13 • Patron Saint of Hospital Administrators and Immigrants

Frances Xavier Cabrini was the first United States citizen to be canonized. Her deep trust in the loving care of her God gave her the strength to be a valiant woman doing the work of Christ.

Refused admission to the religious order which had educated her to be a teacher, she began charitable work at the House of Providence Orphanage in Cadogno, Italy. In September 1877, she made her vows there and took the religious habit.



At the urging of Pope Leo XIII, Frances went west. She traveled with six sisters to New York City to work with the thousands of Italian immigrants living there.

She found disappointment and difficulties with every step. When she arrived in New York, the house intended to be her first orphanage in the United States was not available. The archbishop advised her to return to Italy. But Frances, truly a valiant woman, departed from the archbishop's residence all the more determined to establish that orphanage. And she did.

In 35 years, Frances Xavier Cabrini founded 67 institutions dedicated to caring for the poor, the abandoned, the uneducated and the sick. Seeing great need among Italian immigrants who were losing their faith, she organized schools and adult education classes.

The compassion and dedication of Mother Cabrini is still seen in hundreds of thousands of her fellow citizens who care for the sick in hospitals, nursing homes, and state institutions. We complain of increased medical costs in an affluent society, but the daily news shows us millions who have little or no medical care, and who are calling for new Mother Cabrinis to become citizen-servants of their land.

Test God's Generosity!

St. Joan of Arc is a tithing Parish Family who knows that all we have is gifted from God in the first place. Tithing is the practice of trusting God's promise and giving back to God first. The Lord established this spiritual exercise and trained His people how to become sound, joyful and free by giving to God first ("The tithes of the herd and the flock, every tenth animal that passes under the herdsman's rod, shall be sacred to the LORD." Leviticus 27:32; "Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, That there may be food in my house. Put me to the test, says the LORD of hosts, And see if I do not open the flood-gates of heaven for you, and pour down upon you blessing without measure!" Malachi 3:10).

All the faithful are directed by God to offer 10% of our "increase" (income) to the Lord. It is a profound counter-cultural statement of our gratitude to God and acknowledges our total dependence on Him from whom we have received all that is good in the first place.

And this is legacy giving: It's who and what will be remembered and strengthened because of us when we journey home to the Lord at the end of this short earthly life. Our legacy refers to the portion of all we have from God which we thankfully give back once He calls us to glory. Diocesan March for Life Pilgrimage Thursday, January 20-Friday, January 21, 2022

Diocesan Youth Conference Friday, February 11 - Sunday, February 13, 2022

The Diocesan Youth Conference (DYC) is an annual weekend event that gathers high school youth from Diocese of Richmond parishes at the Greater Richmond Convention Center in Richmond, Virginia.

DYC is a highly energetic and engaging opportunity for our high school teenagers to gather as a larger Church community and celebrate the richness of our Catholic faith. The Conference is open to youth who are in 8th through 12th grade for the 2021-2022 academic year.

The youth registration fee is \$151 if registered by November 30, 2021. After that, the registration fee is \$201. The final registration deadline is January 9, 2022.

What are some highlights of the Diocesan Youth Conference for 2022?

- **Sacraments.** Mass will be celebrated on both Saturday and Sunday with all attendees. In addition, opportunities for Eucharistic Adoration and the Sacrament of Reconciliation will be available.
- **Breakout Sessions.** We will offer breakout sessions for adults and youth focused on engaging topics, including several panel-type discussions.

• **Diocesan Youth Choir.** We invite interested youth to participate in the Diocesan Youth Choir for Sunday Mass at DYC. Participants need to indicate if they would like to participate on their registration; these participants and their youth ministers will be notified about rehearsals during the weekend.

The theme this year is **Breathe**, based on Ezekiel 37 and John 3:8. In the book of Ezekiel, the prophet presents to us a vision of a valley of dry bones. The bones cover the valley floor, countless, dry, lifeless. The Lord reveals to Ezekiel that these bones represent the house of Israel and that they are without hope. However, the Lord gives new bodies to the bones, binding them together. Then, He breathes life into the bodies. The Lord says that He will open the graves and bring the people back to Israel, additionally He will put His spirit in the people that they may come to life.
