
Welcome OUR MISSION

#### SACRAMENTS

*Infant Baptism:* Celebrated on the second and fourth weekend of each month; Saturday at 3:00 p.m. or Sunday following the 11:00 a.m. Mass. Baptisms also may be celebrated during Mass (except during Holy Week). Please contact Deacon Jim (757-898-5570). Parents are required to complete a Baptismal Preparation session prior to a Baptism; these are presented on the first weekend of January, March, May, July, September and November following the 11:00 a.m. Mass. Session dates and location will be posted in the bulletin.

*Confirmation:* This Sacrament fortifies us in the power of the Holy Spirit for a full experience of human living. Confirmation is conferred normatively upon teens in their sophomore year or through the RCIA process for all those, children or adults, who are converting into the fullness of the Catholic faith. Sincere preparation must precede the reception of this beautiful Sacrament.

Anointing of the Sick: The Sacrament of the sick may be received after weekday or weekend Masses with prior notice. The Sacrament may also be celebrated with a personal visit to a home or care facility so that family and friends may be present.

*Sacrament of Marriage:* Couples called to the Sacrament of Marriage should contact the Parish Office at least 6 months prior to the desired wedding date. Please make no firm arrangements until meeting with the Deacon/Priest.

#### **ON A MISSION**

Reflection on

The purpose of parish life is to form and send intentional missionary disciples of Jesus Christ. I wonder if sometimes we become so focused in on being "formed" that our parish life – everything from sacramental formation to liturgies to social events – becomes a comfort zone, a place where we just want to hang out and be, well, "religious." Being fed and formed are essential, and there is nothing wrong with have a vibrant parish home and family where this takes place.

We are also "sent." The Great Commandment (Love... God... others) and the Great Commission (go... baptize... teach) form the mission that awaits our attention beyond the walls and campuses of our parishes. Today's Gospel gives us Jesus' mission instructions to the first group to be sent. There are two elements of these instructions that jump out at me.

First, the Twelve are sent out "two by two." From the very beginning, there is community in mission! We aren't sent out alone. Different gifts are needed. You have something to give that I don't have, and vice versa. This anticipates Paul's vision of the Church as the Body of Christ: a body with many, different parts that complement one another and form a unity.

Second, Jesus instructs them to "take nothing for the journey…" In other words, rely completely on God's grace. Don't let possessions, or the human desire for recognition distract you from the mission. Don't even let someone's rejection of the message upset you, just keep going. The harvest is rich!

#### ST. KATERI TEKAKWITHA

Feast Day: July 14 • Patron Saint of First Nations Peoples

The blood of martyrs is the seed of saints. Nine years after the Jesuits Isaac Jogues and Jean de Lelande were tomahawked by Iroquois warriors, a baby girl was born near the place of their martyrdom, Auriesville, New York.

Her mother was a Christian Algonquin, taken captive by the Iroquois and given as wife to the chief of the Mohawk clan, the boldest and fiercest of the Five Nations. When she was four, Tekakwitha lost her parents and little brother in a smallpox epidemic that left her disfigured and half blind. She was adopted by an uncle, who succeeded her



father as chief. He hated the coming of the Blackrobes – Jesuit missionaries – but could do nothing to them because a peace treaty with the French required their presence in villages with Christian captives. She was moved by the words of three Blackrobes who lodged with her uncle, but fear of him kept her from seeking instruction. Tekakwitha refused to marry a Mohawk brave, and at 19 finally got the courage to take the step of converting. She was baptized with the name Kateri--Catherine--on Easter Sunday.

She was always in danger, for her conversion and holy life created great opposition. On the advice of a priest, Kateri stole away one night and began a 200-mile walking journey to a Christian Indian village at Sault St. Louis, near Montreal.

For three years she grew in holiness under the direction of a priest and an older Iroquois woman, giving herself totally to God in long hours of prayer, in charity, and in strenuous penance. Kateri did not know about religious life for women until she visited Montreal. Inspired by this, she and two friends wanted to start a community, but the local priest dissuaded her. She humbly accepted an "ordinary" life. She practiced extremely severe fasting as penance for the conversion of her nation. Kateri Tekakwitha died the afternoon before Holy Thursday. Witnesses said that her emaciated face changed color and became like that of a healthy child. The lines of suffering, even the pockmarks, disappeared and the touch of a smile came upon her lips. She was beatified in 1980 and canonized in 2012.

All the faithful are directed by God to offer 10% of our "increase" (income) to the Lord. It is a profound counter-cultural statement of our gratitude to God and acknowledges our total dependence on Him from whom we have received all that is good in the first place.


