
Welcome OUR MISSION

SACRAMENTS

Infant Baptism: Celebrated on the second and fourth weekend of each month; Saturday at 3:00 p.m. or Sunday following the 11:00 a.m. Mass. Baptisms also may be celebrated during Mass (except during Holy Week). Please contact Deacon Jim (757-898-5570). Parents are required to complete a Baptismal Preparation session prior to a Baptism; these are presented on the first weekend of January, March, May, July, September and November following the 11:00 a.m. Mass. Session dates and location will be posted in the bulletin.

Confirmation: This Sacrament fortifies us in the power of the Holy Spirit for a full experience of human living. Confirmation is conferred normatively upon teens in their sophomore year or through the RCIA process for all those, children or adults, who are converting into the fullness of the Catholic faith. Sincere preparation must precede the reception of this beautiful Sacrament.

Anointing of the Sick: The Sacrament of the sick may be received after weekday or weekend Masses with prior notice. The Sacrament may also be celebrated with a personal visit to a home or care facility so that family and friends may be present.

Sacrament of Marriage: Couples called to the Sacrament of Marriage should contact the Parish Office at least 6 months prior to the desired wedding date. Please make no firm arrangements until meeting with the Deacon/Priest.

WALK BY FAITH

Reflection on Mark 4:26-34

Paul tells us that "we walk by faith and not by sight." What does this mean?

We certainly "see" and engage our other physical senses as we encounter the world around us, understanding what we encounter in all the normal, reasonable, and conventional ways. But this way of knowing is not the orientation that is most significant to us. Rather, faith – a way of seeing the "more than meets the eye" – is our primary orientation. We are attentive to God and the movements of grace within created reality. Knowing that God is active, we are always reaching for his presence, open and malleable to God's movement and where it might take us.

God initiates, humans respond. As Catholics, we are blessed to have been gifted with our sacramental life. We know that the Seven Sacraments are privileged moments of God's grace. We can always encounter God in these sacramental celebrations. But God is also always reaching out to touch us, initiating his loving presence, in myriads of ways every day. So we understand faith not so much as a noun, but as a verb – a way of acting, of seeing, of being in the world that allows us to receive God as God chooses to come to us, and to respond.

SAINT ANTONY OF PADUA *Feast Day: June 13 • Patron Saint of Lost Articles*

Born in 1195 in Portugal, Antony of Padua entered monastic life at the age of fifteen and joined the Order of St. Augustine. Stirred to be like the Franciscan martyrs from Morocco, Antony decided to dedicate his life to spreading the Word of the Lord. Antony became the patron of recovering lost items because of the celebrated story of his lost prayer book. The beloved volume went missing, stolen by a young monk. Antony prayed to find the lost book and suddenly an apparition came to the thieving monk, ordering him to return the property to Antony. The book was rightfully restored to its owner. Since then, throughout the ages, Antony has been looked to for aid in finding lost articles.

St. Joan of Arc is a tithing Parish Family who knows that all we have is gifted from God in the first place. Tithing is the practice of trusting God's promise and giving back to God first. The Lord established this spiritual exercise and trained His people how to become sound, joyful and free by giving to God first ("The tithes of the herd and the flock, every tenth animal that passes under the herdsman's rod, shall be sacred to the LORD." Leviticus 27:32; "Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, That there may be food in my house. Put me to the test, says the LORD of hosts, And see if I do not open the floodgates of heaven for you, and pour down upon you blessing without measure!" Malachi 3:10).

All the faithful are directed by God to offer 10% of our "increase" (income) to the Lord. It is a profound counter-cultural statement of our gratitude to God and acknowledges our total dependence on Him from whom we have received all that is good in the first place.


