

SACRAMENTS

Infant Baptism: Normally celebrated on a Saturday at 3:00 p.m. Baptisms also may be celebrated during Holy Mass (except during Holy Week). Please contact Jennifer Strash (757-898-5570) to schedule. Parents are required to complete a Baptismal Preparation session prior to a Baptism; these are presented on the first weekend of January, March, May, July, September and November following the 11:30 a.m. Mass. Session dates may be adjusted due to holidays. Session dates and location will be posted in the bulletin.

Confirmation: This Sacrament fortifies us in the power of the Holy Spirit for a full experience of human living. Confirmation is conferred normatively upon teens in their sophomore year or through the OCI process for all those, children or adults, who are converting into the fullness of the Catholic faith. Sincere preparation must precede the reception of this beautiful Sacrament.

Anointing of the Sick: The Sacrament of the sick may be received after weekday or weekend Masses with prior notice. The Sacrament may also be celebrated in the Parish Office or with a personal visit to a home or care facility.

Sacrament of Marriage: Couples called to the Sacrament of Marriage should contact the Parish Office at least 6 months prior to the desired wedding date. Please make no firm arrangements until after meeting with the Deacon/Priest.

The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass

By an apostolic tradition taking its origin from the very day of Christ's Resurrection, the Church celebrates the paschal mystery every eighth day, the day that is rightly called the Lord's Day. On Sunday, the Christian faithful ought to gather together, so that by listening to the word of God and sharing in the Eucharist, they may recall the passion, death and Resurrection of the Lord Jesus and give thanks to God who has given them a new birth with a lively hope through the Resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. The Lord's Day is therefore the first and greatest festival, one to be set before the loving devotion of the faithful and impressed upon it, so that it may be also a day of joy and of freedom from work. Other celebrations must not take precedence over it, unless they are truly of the greatest importance, since it is the foundation and the kernel of the whole liturgical year. (Sacrosanctum Concilium, nn. 7-8. 106)



ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS: THE REVOLUTIONARY ACTION OF GOD'S EUCHARIST

Calendar of Transformative Social/Spiritual Events
For My Family

Dec. 1 – First Sunday of Advent: Lighting the first purple candle of our Advent wreath; committing my family to enter this revolutionary season of God's approaching action in the human race, in my own family. Will I love God's fullness enough to see right through the focus on earthly things that are all around me? Will I lift up this beautiful time before Christmas into a sacred and hopeful awareness of Christ's increase?

6:00 pm, front of the church and in J.P. II Center – Blessing the outdoor parish crèche and then all family Nativity scenes. Celebrate with prayers, hymns and carols as we bless our beautiful outdoor crèche and your family Nativity scene.

Dec. 8 – Second Sunday of Advent: Lighting the second purple candle on our Advent wreath; Supporting our spouses and our children, young or grown, to take note of the deep pining inside every human heart for heaven's beauty to meet me and fill me.

Dec. 9 – Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception: Holy Mass at 9:00 am & 7:00 pm.

Dec. 10 – Tuesday, 6:30 pm, Advent Mission: *Christmas – Fact or Fiction: Proclaiming the Reality of God: Scientific & Human Evidence*

Dec. 11 – Wednesday, 6:30 pm, Advent Mission: *The Incarnation Continues: Lourdes and the Miraculous Cures*

Dec. 12 – Thursday, **7:00 pm** in the church: Advent Penance Service – Do we examine our conscience during this revolutionary season of Advent? Christ cannot increase where there has been no preparation to welcome Him. All are welcome to the miracle of the Sacrament of Reconciliation when we step through the DOOR OF GOD'S MERCY which is our only hope: God and sinners reconciled. Numerous thankful priests will be available to celebrate God's healing/forgiving mercy in all of our lives.

Dec. 15 – Third Sunday of Advent (Gaudete Sunday): Lighting the rose candle on our Advent wreath; we acknowledge the Joy that God has already enlightened all human flesh by His birth. On Gaudete Sunday we hope for Jesus, the Light of the World, to truly increase in everyone in our families.

Dec. 19 – Thursday, 7:00 pm in the church: Lessons and Carols – a holy and joyful evening of Advent hope, filled with Advent and Christmas music, Scriptures, prayers and fellowship.

Dec. 22 – Fourth Sunday of Advent: The final purple candle is lighted; the wreath fully illumined represents each heart which Christ longs to enter and fill more completely. Now we focus more than ever on approaching Christmas.

Dec. 24 – Vigil Mass of the Nativity of the Lord: Holy Mass 5:00 pm - God's covenant gloriously shines forth in the anticipated birth of Jesus, son of David. The Word is made flesh.

Dec. 25 – The Nativity of the Lord: Holy Mass at Midnight & 10:00 am: On this day of great Joy in heaven and on earth, the Church glories in the newborn Son of God, the Word-Made-Flesh, Jesus, who embodies for us the REVOLUTIONARY ACTION BY OUR GOD. Jesus, the Eucharist of God, IS all the hope and peace we seek. Salvation has been definitively, once and for all, revealed to all nations in Christ.

Dec. 29 – First Sunday of Christmas – The Solemnity of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph: The Holy Family is the "real life" model for all families. Our family life becomes deeper, more loving, more healed, more glorifying of God when we live the life of the Sacraments within our homes. This is called the "domestic church." St. John Chrysostom urged all Christians to make each home a "family church," and in doing so, we sanctify the family unit.

Jan. 1 – The Octave Day of Christmas: Solemnity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of God: Holy Mass 10:00 am & 7:00 pm - Christ's birth was made possible by Mary's *fiat*: "Be it done unto me according to Thy word." The birth of the New Year is entrusted to the intercession of Jesus' mother and our own, Mary. On this day, we are reminded of the role that the Blessed Virgin played in the plan of our salvation.

Jan. 5 – The Second Sunday of Christmas, The Epiphany of the Lord: Epiphany comes from a Greek verb meaning "to reveal." Epiphany originally celebrated four different events, in the following order of importance: the Baptism of the Lord, Christ's first miracle of changing of water into wine at the wedding in Cana, the Nativity of Christ, and the visitation of the Wise Men, or Magi. All four REVEAL and ANNOUNCE the Revolutionary Action by our God in the human race.

Jan. 12 – The Third Sunday of Christmas, The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord: This is the final major feast of the Christmas Season and, in fact, the last day of this Season of Light and Joy. Today the heavens opened and the waters of the sea became sweet and fragrant; the earth rejoiced, the mountains and hills exulted—because Christ was baptized by John in the Jordan. In Jesus Christ, our Baptism makes us ONE in the Revolutionary Action of our God as the Eucharist of Christ.


Children's Liturgy of the Word
