#### **SACRAMENTS**

*Infant Baptism:* Normally celebrated on a Saturday at 3:00 p.m. Baptisms also may be celebrated during Holy Mass (except during Holy Week). Please contact Jennifer Strash (757-898-5570) to schedule. Parents are required to complete a Baptismal Preparation session prior to a Baptism; these are presented on the first weekend of January, March, May, July, September and November following the 11:30 a.m. Mass. Session dates may be adjusted due to holidays. Session dates and location will be posted in the bulletin.

*Confirmation:* This Sacrament fortifies us in the power of the Holy Spirit for a full experience of human living. Confirmation is conferred normatively upon teens in their sophomore year or through the OCI process for all those, children or adults, who are converting into the fullness of the Catholic faith. Sincere preparation must precede the reception of this beautiful Sacrament.

*Anointing of the Sick:* The Sacrament of the Sick may be received after weekday or weekend Masses with prior notice. The Sacrament may also be celebrated in the Parish Office or with a personal visit to a home or care facility.

*Sacrament of Marriage:* Couples called to the Sacrament of Marriage should contact the Parish Office at least 6 months prior to the desired wedding date. Please make no firm arrangements until after meeting with the Deacon/Priest.


#### FAITH AND LOVE

Reflection on Luke 9:28b-36

The Transfiguration of Jesus in this weekend's Gospel is closely linked to the Baptism of Jesus, for on both occasions the sky speaks those words of generative love – "This is my Beloved Son..." Each of us hears these same words spoken to us at Baptism, when we begin the lifelong journey of faith, the journey of embracing and living the gift of faith.

The word, faith, is sometimes understood as accepting something you cannot prove or understand. People often say, "such and such cannot be explained, you simply have to believe it, you must have faith." However, it seems clear that when Jesus speaks of faith, He means first of all and last of all to trust unreservedly that you are loved.

One of my most powerful memories of my grandmother is the words that she spoke repeatedly to each of us, her grandchildren, whenever we took leave after visiting her. As we walked out the door, she would say, "Remember, God loves you, and there isn't a d---- thing you can do about it!" (She was rather feisty in character and language!) I recall these words whenever doubt enters and faith falters, and I am transfigured. – Fr. Jay

#### **SAINT PATRICK**

Saint of the Day: March 17

Patron Saint of Engineers, Ireland, Nigeria

Current research places Patrick's dates of birth and death a little later than earlier accounts. Patrick may have been born in Dunbarton, Scotland, Cumberland, England, or in northern Wales. At 16, he and a large number of his father's slaves and vassals were captured by Irish raiders and sold as slaves in Ireland.

His captivity had meant spiritual conversion. He may have studied at Lerins, off the French coast; he spent years at Auxerre, France, and was consecrated bishop at the age of 43. His great desire was to proclaim the good news to the Irish.

Because of the island's pagan background, Patrick was emphatic in encouraging widows to remain chaste and young women to consecrate their virginity to Christ. He ordained many priests, divided the country into dioceses, held Church councils, founded several monasteries and continually urged his people to greater holiness in Christ.

He suffered much opposition from pagan druids and was criticized in both England and Ireland for the way he conducted his mission. In a relatively short time, the island had experienced deeply the Christian spirit, and was prepared to send out missionaries whose efforts were greatly responsible for Christianizing Europe.

Patrick was a man of action, with little inclination toward learning. One of the few certainly authentic writings is his Confessio, above all an act of homage to God for having called Patrick, unworthy sinner, to the apostolate.

There is hope in the fact that his burial place is said to be in County Down in Northern Ireland, long the scene of strife and violence.
