SACRAMENTS

Infant Baptism: Normally celebrated on a Saturday at 3:00 p.m. Baptisms also may be celebrated during Holy Mass (except during Holy Week). Please contact Jennifer Strash (757-898-5570) to schedule. Parents are required to complete a Baptismal Preparation session prior to a Baptism; these are presented on the first weekend of January, March, May, July, September and November following the 11:30 a.m. Mass. Session dates may be adjusted due to holidays. Session dates and location will be posted in the bulletin.

Confirmation: This Sacrament fortifies us in the power of the Holy Spirit for a full experience of human living. Confirmation is conferred normatively upon teens in their sophomore year or through the OCI process for all those, children or adults, who are converting into the fullness of the Catholic faith. Sincere preparation must precede the reception of this beautiful Sacrament.

Anointing of the Sick: The Sacrament of the sick may be received after weekday or weekend Masses with prior notice. The Sacrament may also be celebrated in the Parish Office or with a personal visit to a home or care facility.

Sacrament of Marriage: Couples called to the Sacrament of Marriage should contact the Parish Office at least 6 months prior to the desired wedding date. Please make no firm arrangements until after meeting with the Deacon/Priest.

TEMPTATION


Reflection on Luke 4:1-13

Temptations come to us all, and Jesus is no exception. (He was tested in every way that we are, yet is without sin). Now, I suspect that the three temptations recorded here in Luke's Gospel did not just occur this one time in the desert, but returned over and over again to plague Jesus. Such is the nature of temptation.

How Jesus responds to these temptations can assist us in our struggle with them. What seems most remarkable and powerful in Jesus' response is that He is in touch with His core, spiritual identity. In a particular way, Jesus is in touch with the voice of the Father that spoke to Him at His baptism, "This is my Son, the Beloved, in whom I am well-pleased." Jesus has meditated on this identity for a sacred time of 40 days and 40 nights, and has come to some conclusions about what this means.

The Lenten journey we are embarking upon is our sacred time to reflect deeply and anew on our core, spiritual identities. For we, too, are the beloved sons and daughters of the Father. When we are in touch with this truth, we will discover the strength and courage to call out specific temptations in our lives for what they are – suggested paths not in line with who we are; actions inappropriate to our identity.

SAINT FRANCES OF ROME

Saint of the Day: March 9 Patron Saint of Motorists and Widows

A devoted and loving wife, Frances longed for a lifestyle of prayer and service, so she organized a group of women to minister to the needs of Rome's poor.

Born of wealthy parents, Frances found herself attracted to the religious life during her youth. But her parents objected and a young nobleman was selected to be her husband. As she became acquainted with her new relatives, Frances soon discovered that the wife of her husband's brother also wished to live a life of service and prayer. So the two, Frances and Vannozza, set out together to help the poor.

The years passed, and Frances gave birth to two sons and a daughter. With the new responsibilities of family life, the young mother turned her attention more to the needs of her own household.

The family flourished under Frances' care, but within a few years a great plague began to sweep across Italy. It struck Rome with devastating cruelty and left Frances' second son dead. In an effort to help alleviate some of the suffering, Frances used all her money and sold her possessions to buy whatever the sick might possibly need. When all the resources had been exhausted, Frances and Vannozza went door to door begging. Later, Frances' daughter died, and the saint opened a section of her house as a hospital.

Frances became more and more convinced that this way of life was so necessary for the world, and it was not long before she requested and was given permission to found a society of women bound by no vows. They simply offered themselves to God and to the service of the poor. Once the society was established, Frances chose not to live at the community residence, but rather at home with her husband. She did this for seven years, until her husband passed away, and then came to live the remainder of her life with the society – serving the poorest of the poor.
